Spotlight on language access

The Short Course on MARS

In May, JRP members **Arleen Lopez** and **Dorothy Sheu** attended <u>The Short Course on Multilingual Approaches to Research Studies</u> (MARS) through the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP).

This three-day training took place at the CHOP Roberts Center for Pediatric Research in Philadelphia. Participants from around the US attended to learn from an expert leadership team that includes **Priscilla Ortiz, PhD, CMI-Spanish** (certified healthcare interpreter and researcher), **Robert Schrauf, PhD** (linguist and anthropologist), **Katherine Yun, MD MHS** (researcher and pediatrician), and **Nadège U. Mudenge** (clinical research coordinator). Topics of the training ranged from multilingual population-health survey design and analysis to selecting a translation protocol.

A highlight for Arleen and Dorothy from this highly interactive, inclusive, interdisciplinary training was when attendees role-played working with a language interpreter.

Participants in this role-play were provided an informed consent form and told to recruit a patient. With the consent form in hand, they entered a room with a (fake) patient and (real) language interpreter. They greeted the patient, introduced the study, and went through the consent form with the assistance of the interpreter. Participants and instructors in the course provided feedback after the exercise:

Did you speak directly to the patient? How did you position yourself relative to the patient and interpreter? Did you use plain language? Avoid jargon? Say one thought at a time?




What's next?

Following this course, the JRP will enrich our <u>Language Interpretation Guide</u> with best practices for managing conversations, ensuring message clarity, and respecting linguistic differences.

Alternative payment methods

At Penn, multiple methods exist to pay a study participant, though most studies use reloadable debits cards, called ClinCards. Often researchers are not sure if there are other options that may be more accessible to their study populations. The JRP has developed a guide for paying research participants using these ClinCard alternatives.

A Penn team's push to make research more inclusive

Penn's Palliative and Advanced Illness Research (PAIR) Center is working to bring more underrepresented racial and ethnic backgrounds into their research, and to train Al models to be free from bias.

In May, **Rachel Kohn** and **Adina Lieberman** discussed the work of the JRP in a feature for Penn Medicine News.


In addition to sharing information about the JRP Toolkit of resources, Rachel offered insights on hot topics in research, such as artificial intelligence, or AI. Regarding the use of AI models in clinical decision making, Rachel shared concerns about biased data being fed into AI models for clinical decision making:

"One major concern about this process is that clinicians rarely know the source of the data and assume that they should take the decision support recommendation at face value without pausing to consider the algorithm inputs. 'Algorithmic bias' is a hugely burgeoning field trying to address this very issue."




